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District Career and Tech Students Earned 1,629 College Credits this School Year from Ivy Tech State College

Parents of Porter County CTE students saved \$154,755 this year in tuition payments for students who were enrolled in Porter County Career and Technical classes. 528 students were awarded college credits this year from Ivy Tech. Some students earned college credit from multiple colleges. At a tuition cost of \$95/credit hour at Ivy Tech, the \$154,755 represents a savings to the parents and our community. These students learned and mastered college level material while still in high school saving them and their parents future tuition costs, all while learning that they are capable of college level work. These students will leave high school with a high school diploma, technical skills certificate, and a college transcript.

Assistant Vice Chancellor for IVTSC, Ken Rosenblum, feels that these students have made a wise choice by starting their college career while still in high school and he congratulates them for their effort.

From February 23rd thru April 30th, Gortrac had the opportunity to host an intern student from the local community. The internship was part of a larger career awareness campaign designed to promote careers in manufacturing and logistics to high school students in Porter County.

Andre worked in every area of the plant, from engineering, to plastics, metals, RUD, barcut, fabrication, shipping, and the office. We definitely kept him busy during his time on the job.

To support the internship, the Center of Workforce Innovations developed a partnership with the Porter County Career and Technical Center and JobWorks, a WorkOne partner agency. Andre's pay over the last 10 weeks was funded 100% by WorkOne. Working as a team, JobWorks, the Career and Tech Center, CWI, and Gortrac built a structured internship experience that helped Andre gain first-hand knowledge of the world of manufacturing.



Beautify Indiana State Parks

SUMMER JOBS FOR LOW-INCOME YOUTH AND YOUNG ADULTS

The federal stimulus package includes **funding** to create **summer jobs** for **low-income youth and young adults**.

Indiana is using these funds to create the **Young Hoosiers Conservation Corps**. Up to **2,000** low-income Hoosiers between the **ages of 16-24** will be hired to work within the **Indiana Department of Natural Resources**.

These summer jobs will involve beautifying Indiana's 33 state parks and reservoirs, reconstructing historic buildings, creating 113 miles of new trails, renovating over 1,100 miles of existing trails and restoring 2,600 acres of natural habitats.

The jobs will run from May 1 - September 30, 2009, and pay \$8.50 per hour.
