Letter from the Indiana State School Superintendent

My journey to becoming the state superintendent of public instruction was one of many stops over a 20-year span of time. I've spent time as a teacher, a coach, an elementary school principal, a high school principal, an assistant superintendent for operations, and as a superintendent. Along the way, I learned some basic truths about our educational system that I brought into this new job with me: Education only gets better when we keep discussions student-focused, not adult-focused. If local schools have more flexibility, they will come up with creative and successful solutions. Traditional public schools are no longer in a position to service the needs of every child, and we must increase, expand and diversify the learning opportunities available to our students.

It is this lesson that is of particular importance to me, and that I think is important to all of you working to offer better vocational programs. As the father of a dyslexic child, I know first-hand that the needs of every child is different, and I know that she would not be able to work through college at her own pace had she not first gone through a vocational program to become a beautician. But I also have another important perspective on our career and technical education programs because one of the stops on my journey was as principal of Prosser School of Technology in New Albany.

One of the first things I did at Prosser was to tie every single one of our programs to a state or national certification. I wanted our students to have the opportunity to walk out of the door with more than just a high school diploma and a set of skills; I wanted them to walk out with proof that they were qualified and able to compete for skilled trade jobs with anyone else in the market for their field. As the head of Indiana's Department of Education, it's a model I hope we can bring to every vocational school in the state, not just to better serve and prepare our K-12 population, but to better serve and prepare Hoosiers of all ages looking at new career paths in these tough economic times.

I realize that this goal will not happen overnight, and it will not happen without some serious investment in our existing programs. I'm writing to you today to assure you that you I am committed to helping see this vision through, and the entire Department of Education is committed along with me. In fact, I've already had some meetings to discuss our abilities to use federal stimulus money to invest in our vocational schools and programs so they meet the standards needed for state and national certification. While I can't promise today that this is how we will use a large portion of stimulus funds, I can say there is a very real possibility this goal will move faster than we could have ever imagined.

As we continue charting the course for Hoosier education over the next four years, I want to reassure you that my door is open and I am always eager to hear suggestions. I've been in your shoes before and I understand some of the challenges vocational education faces, but I need your help to understand them all. I look forward to working with you all in the future, and together we'll change the way Hoosiers educate their children.
