
A professional production team from New York flew here to work with our students to shoot and produce all three videos. Please congratulate these three hard working students!



Safer Internet Day is February 6

This is some great information for a class discussion about social media and the internet. Microsoft started a teen Council for Digital Good about online life and teenagers. Teen members of the council came up with the ideas and recommendations themselves.

Skills – Some important competencies for life online

- Build and repair resilience to ensure young people can bounce back from unpleasant online experiences.
- Pause and think before sending or posting.
- Your online profile represents YOU so, be sure to present yourself in the best possible and truthful light.
- **Be a skeptic** and question the actions and motivations of others.
- **Instill morals** and teach children ethics and etiquette online; it will serve them well online and in adulthood. **Advice** Additional points that highlight the need for "skills" and "perspective"
- Wait until you're 13 and meet the age requirements to use social media.
- Take off the mask and be online who you are in real life.
- **Disagree respectfully** rather than by lashing out.
- Your voice and report [to trusted authorities] matter, so take advantage of tech companies' resources for reporting illegal or harmful content and conduct.
- Use the power of the internet to **empower** others.

Perspective – Thoughts for maintaining a healthy online outlook

- Your screen is 2D while real life is 3D What's online can fall flat, so always consider context and other factors.
- **Don't be a prisoner to your cellphone** by letting online interactions control your life.
- **Posts affect you and your family**, so remember, once you hit send, there's no taking them back.
- No, you're not getting a free iPhone If a deal sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
- Focus on the life you live and don't let technology dominate daily activities.

The teens have offered some great counsel to help everyone lead safer, more productive and more fun-filled lives online.

The window is now open for seniors and their parents to fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form at www.fafsa.gov. The first step is for both student and parent to get the FAFSA ID at this site. Indiana's deadline to file is March 10, 2018 (midnight, Central Time).
