Ivy Tech Student Placement Assessment – Compass Exam

All students enrolling at Ivy Tech need to take a placement exam called the Compass Test. Students should take that test while still in high school. The test can be retaken once every semester. The test allows Ivy Tech staff to accurately place students in college level courses. High school students can go to Ivy Tech just about any time to take the assessment.

Indiana Changes Youth Driver Licensing Law

You must be at least 16 years of age to get a learner's permit. The learner's permit allows you to drive a car as long as an adult, 21 years old or older, with a valid driver's license, is in the front seat of the car with you.

You must be at least 16 years, 270 days of age and hold a learner permit for a period of 180 days before you may apply for a driver's license.

In addition, if you are applying for a driver's license on or after July 1, 2010, you must complete at least 50 hours of supervised driving practice with a licensed instructor, a licensed driver who is at least 25 years old, or a spouse who is at least 21 years old. At least 10 hours of supervised driving practice must be nighttime driving.

Under 18 Driver License Restrictions

Teen drivers under the age of 18 are considered probationary license holders. The following restrictions apply:

- If you get a probationary driver's license on or after July 1, 2009, you may not drive between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. for 180 days after getting your license.
- After you have driven for 180 days, you may not drive during the following hours:
 - o Saturday and Sunday, between 1 a.m. and 5 a.m.
 - o Sunday through Thursday, after 11 p.m.
 - o Monday through Friday, before 5 a.m.

Exceptions:

To or From School, Religious Activity or Civil Rights Activity Sponsored by a Government or Non-Profit Agency. If Accompanied by Parent, Guardian or Appointed Responsible Adult.

Cell Phone and Other Rules

If your probationary driver's license was issued after July 1, 2009 and you are under 18, then you may not operate a motor vehicle while using any type of electronic (telecommunication) device until the individual becomes eighteen (18) years of age unless the telecommunications device is being used to make a 911 emergency call.

All Passengers Must Wear a Safety Belt

You Must Abide by All State and Local Curfew Laws

If you are 16 or 17 years old when you obtain your driver's license, your license is considered probationary until you turn 18 years old. If you have a probationary driver's license every passenger in the vehicle that you are driving must wear a seat belt even if the vehicle is a truck or a sport utility vehicle.

Driving with passengers

You may not drive with passengers for 180 days after getting your license, unless you are also accompanied by a licensed instructor, an individual with a valid Indiana driver's license who is 25 years or older, or a parent, guardian, or step-parent who is 21 years or older. You may drive with your child, sibling, or spouse during the hours allowed by law.

It is the policy of the Porter County Career and Technical Education Program to comply with all state and federal regulations prohibiting discrimination on the basis or race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or disability in enrollment procedures or access to programs.

The Twenty-first Century Scholars Program

The Twenty-first Century Scholars Program began in 1990 as Indiana's way of raising the educational aspirations of low- and moderate-income families. The program aims to ensure that all Indiana families can afford a college education for their children.

Income-eligible 6th, 7th and 8th graders who enroll in the program and fulfill a pledge of good citizenship to the state are guaranteed the cost of four years of undergraduate college tuition at any participating public college or university in Indiana. If the student attends a private institution, the state will award an amount comparable to that of a public institution. If the student attends a participating proprietary school, the state will award a tuition scholarship equal to that of Ivy Tech Community College.

Seniors: Forms and Deadlines

For students graduating high school in 2011, complete the following steps to collect your Twenty-first Century Scholars Scholarship:

- 1. Participate in a Senior Exit Interview. You may attend a Senior Exit Interview in-person between September 2010 and February 2011 or complete the process online by <u>clicking here</u>
- 2. Complete and submit a Twenty-first Century Scholars pledge Affirmation Form on time. To be considered on time, the Twenty-first Century Scholars Program must receive your completed form on or before March 10, 2011. This form will be available during the Senior Exit Interview process.
- 3. File for state and federal financial aid by completing and submitting a 2011-2012 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) on time. To be considered on time, the federal processor must receive your completed FAFSA on or before March 10, 2011. The 2011-2012 FAFSA can be accessed at http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/.
- 4. Make all necessary corrections to your 2011-2012 FAFSA on or before May 16, 2011.
- 5. Apply for admission and institutional financial aid at the Indiana college you will attend by the deadline for each college.

Enroll as a full-time college student and maintain Indiana residency. (Source: http://www.in.gov/ssaci/2384.htm)
