From the rechristening of the 1912 train depot on Career Center property to numerous state and local honors, 2016 went down as quite a year.

A chilly Oct. 25 found hundreds of local residents, leaders and train aficionados checking out the vintage Grand Trunk depot. Inside they found students in costumes befitting the era of passenger train travel, demos of health care throughout the ages and a timeline of developments with the depot, which will eventually hold classroom activities.

The depot project and rooftop solar energy project brought honors for Director Jon Groth. He was inducted as a Fellow into the area Society of Innovators.

Video Production & Media Studies garnered two prizes as best CTE program in the state and as the Indiana Television School of the Year.

The district welcomed new teachers for 16-17. Jennifer Golenia started a new Computer Tech Support class at Valparaiso High School. Other new teachers are Beth Ammons, Marketing at PCCTC; Allen Cochran

and Brian Carden, Work Study at Chesterton High; Tom Garzella, Construction Trades at Chesterton; Mike Wester, Auto Services Technology at PCCTC; and Eric Witt, Industrial Mechanics at Portage High.

Former students are frequent visitors at their previous CTE classes. Four alumni were honored in May as part of the 21 under 21 Community Leaders.

Honorees included Jordan Berdovich, former Health Occupations student; Michael Johnson, former Industrial Mechanics and Machining student; Trevor Mahlmann, former Video Productions student; and Jim Schergen, former Auto Services Technology student.

Emily Tezak, former Health Occupations student, was honored in September with a One Region Promise of the Future Award for persons under 21 who are making a difference.

All are successfully pursuing college and/or employment and using the skills they used in CTE classes.

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Director's Report

We have had students like **Dani Suiter**, a star volleyball athlete from Valparaiso High School, who is now attending Duquesne University on an athletic scholarship. She learned through her Health Science Ed 2 program that she has the compassion and ability to be a future nurse.

Abbey Thomas, another VHS student, explored our Media Production course and then took our Marketing course where she really found her passion to operate a small business someday. Abbey was a four-year cheerleader and varsity softball player. She is happy she has discovered her career passion before asking her parents to help pay for college at Purdue University.

We have other athletes like **Mariah** and **Hailey Haveck** from Morgan Twp HS, who participate in everything at their high school. Both took Health Science Ed 1 last year to explore options for their future careers. Hailey has decided to pursue a career in athletic training while studying Fundamentals of Sports Medicine this year. Mariah will continue toward nursing by taking our Health Science Ed 2 program where she will earn her Certified Nurse Assistant license.

Connor Gustafson from Kouts HS, **Cody Jaskulski** from Hobart HS, and **Matt Wright** from Boone Grove all finished our two-year Precision Machining program. All earned 12 college credits earned, and all of them are already employed by Urschel Laboratories along with full scholarships to Vincennes University. **Jena Hammonds** (Wash Twp HS) already works as a machinist at Task Force Tips and attends Vincennes as the first recipient of the Women in STEM Careers Scholarship. **Bradley Atwood** ('015 Wash Twp grad), is working at Custom Crimp in Valparaiso while attending the Modern Machining program at Ivy Tech with his employer paying the tuition.

More than 70 students earned their Certified Nurse Assistant (CNA) license this year. Many have gone directly to work using their CNA license. **Brooke Jabo**, Boone Grove HS grad, has already been hired at Valparaiso Care and Rehab. Brooke is now attending Trine University where she wants to major in physical therapy but continue to work at the nursing home during vacations and summers.

We enhance student options and expand their choices. The examples above are only a few of the numerous outstanding students we have worked with who have found success in starting on a career pathway while in high school. Porter County Career and Tech Education classes are for juniors and seniors, those students who are ready to accept the responsibility of adulthood as soon as it is offered to them. Horticulture Program Nominated for Award

Future gardeners and agronomists alike find themselves taking this year’s featured Career and Technical Education class.

The program has been nominated for the state’s Outstanding Program Award for Career and Technical Education.

Horticulture Science and Landscaping is a one-or two-year opportunity based at Morgan Township High School.

Angie Sutherlin has led the program for 14 years and teaches out of a modern greenhouse plus a traditional classroom.

Students are able to earn up to six dual college credits at no charge from Ivy Tech Community College.

They might go on to universities such as Purdue to study plant propagation, agricultural management or other fields.

Practical experience includes working together, planting together and getting a chance to design some landscapes and gardens during the winter months on computer aided design software.

Students can even earn two science credits in Advanced Life Science toward any Indiana diploma.

State awards will be granted in February.


